~ "Sites of Japan's Meiji industrial revolution" listed on UNESCO's World Heritage List ~

The 39th Session of the World Heritage Committee which was held on 8 July 2015 in Bonn, Germany, adopted the inscription of the "Sites of Japan's Meiji Industrial Revolution: Iron and Steel, Shipbuilding and Coal Mining" to the 2015 UNESCO's World Heritage List. This highly valued property comprises a series of industrial heritage sites that represent the first successful industrialization between the 1850's and 1910 in the non-Western world. *Tōrō Nagashi (灯籠流し), "Lantern cruise" (Shōrō Nagashi)

Tōrō Nagashi festival is a long-held Japanese tradition where candle-lit lanterns are released into rivers to guide the spirits of ancestors back to the other world during the *Obon* season in August. *Tōrō* is another word for lantern, while *nagashi* means "cruise, flow".

The ceremony may be done on some other days of the year for other reasons such as to commemorate the end of World War II, those lost in the bombing of Hiroshima, etc. This peaceful and beautiful custom is a gesture of respect for those who have passed away and gives participants a moment to think about their ancestors and loved ones.



Obon is held in mid-August and it is an important gathering time when many Japanese families return to their hometowns.

It is a festival for commemorating one's ancestors. It is believed that during Obon, the ancestors' spirits return to this world in order to visit their relatives. Traditionally, during that time, lanterns are hung in front of houses to guide the ancestors' spirits, Obon dances (bon odori) are performed, graves are visited and food offerings are made at house altars and temples. Also, thousands of fireworks are lighten to welcome ancestors back to earth from the spirit world, and to send the spirits of the recently deceased off to the spirit world.

Shōrō Nagashi

There are many kinds of such events for the spirits of ancestors and **Shōrō Nagashi** ("Spirit Boat Procession") of Nagasaki is a very famous one.

On the evening of mid-August, the Shōrō Nagashi starts. Beautifully adorned boats carrying the spirits of those that have passed away that year are carried to the harbour. Hundreds of these shōrō-bune (sacred boats made of bamboo and straws, decorated with lighted lanterns) are drawn along the city's main streets with the sounds of bells and firecrackers. After reaching the harbor, recently these boats are not released in the sea or river, but dismantled.

This festival is very popular also because of Masashi Sada, a native song-writer from Nagasaki, who released his song "Shōrō nagashi" in 1974, a big hit with a 1, 3 million sales.
