O Urgent news

- (1) In relation to the incident on warning of Japanese national's execution by the »Islamic State (ISIL)", the Japanese government issued a message, saying: "...such an act of blackmailing through holding the innocent lives as hostage is utterly impermissible..." and: "In any case, Japan will not give in to terrorism, and our position of contributing to the counter-terrorism efforts by the international community remains unchanged." ~ Inauguration of the Third Abe Cabinet ~

On 24 December 2014, the Third Abe Cabinet was inaugurated under the big support of people, which was shown in the recent general election. PM Abe reassigned the previous ministers, except the new defence minister. The new Abe government will continue to carry out important policies such as Abenomics, women's policy and proactive contribution to peace. <u>Details</u>

~ PM Abe and FM Kishida Visit abroad ~

In January, Prime Minister Abe and Foreign Minister Kishida make first visits abroad after the inauguration of the Third Abe Cabinet. While PM Abe visits Egypt, Jordan, Israel and Palestinian Authority from 16-21 January, FM Kishida visits India, France, Belgium and UK from 15-22 January. ~ Japanese and Slovenian companies cooperate on renewable energy projects in Thailand ~

At the end of 2014, a photovoltaic power plant with the capacity of 52MW was built in Lopburi province, Thailand. Robotina, a high-tech company from Slovenia, delivered a complete monitoring system to the Japanese company SHARP, which is the main contractor in this project. Robotina's fully integrated solar plant supervisory system (SPSS) enables efficient operation of large scale photovoltaic plants throughout their life-cycle. <u>Details</u>

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* Setsubun (節分, Bean-Throwing Festival)

- (1) Setsubun, usually celebrated on the 3rd of February, is the day before the Risshun (the day of the beginning of spring in Japan). It marks the last day of winter according to the old lunar calendar. Therefore, the rituals associated with Setsubun focus on bidding farewell to winter and welcoming the approach of spring.
- (2) On the day of Setsubun, people all over Japan perform the custom of *Mamemaki* throwing roasted soybeans either out the door or at a member of the family wearing an *Oni* (demon) mask while saying "In with Fortune! Out with Evil" in order to prevent demons from entering their houses. Then, as part of bringing luck in, people pick up and eat roasted soybeans, one for each year of one's age and one more for bringing good luck for the year to come.
- (3) Bean throwing ceremonies are held at many temples and shrines around the country. People gather at shrines or temples where priests, in some cases, well-known celebrities such as athletes, actors, politicians, or sumo wrestlers-throw dried beans, small envelopes with money, sweets and candies at the crowd and shout their good wishes.
- (4) For Setsubun, people from Western parts of Japan eat a special kind of sushi roll, called *Ehōmaki*. Its name comes from the tradition of eating it facing towards the 恵方 (ehō) "lucky direction." Each year has a different ehō and this year (2015) is West-Southwest. It is believed that your dream will come true if on the evening of Setsubun you are able to eat the entire sushi roll, facing that year's lucky direction, without saying a word.
