~ The 47th General Election of members of the House of Representatives ~

On 14 December 2014, the 47th General Election of the House of Representatives was carried out in Japan. The current coalition parties (LDP and Komeito) got a two-third majority of the lower house seats. PM Abe is expected to launch the 3rd Cabinet on 24 December 2014. Current Ministers are expected to remain on their posts.

~ Launch of Feasibility Study on Smart Community Demonstration Project ~

On 5 December 2014, NEDO (The New Energy and Industrial Technology Development Organization of Japan) and SPIRIT launched a feasibility study for a smart community system demonstration project in Slovenia. During the one-year feasibility study, NEDO and SPIRIT will develop specifications of a detailed plan for a possible future demonstration project. <u>Details</u>

* Oshōgatsu (正月, New Year)

- (1) New Year is the most important holiday in Japan. Homes and entrance gates are decorated with "kadomatsu", ornaments made of pine, bamboo and plum trees.
- (2) For New Years, many Japanese dress into the traditional kimono and visit shrines to pray for happiness and a healthy year. This custom is called the "Hatsumode" (first shrine visit of the New Year).
- (3) Various kinds of special dishes are served afterwards, like: Osechi-ryōri, otoso (sweetened rice wine) and ozōni (a soup with mochi rice cake).
- (4) On New Year's Day, Japanese have a custom of giving money to children. This is known as "otoshidama". It is handed out in small decorated envelopes and the amount of money given depends on the age of the child.
- (5) One of the Japanese New Year's traditions is also "Hanetsuki", a game, played with a wooden paddle called "hagoita" and a shuttle called "hane". The game resembles badminton, played without a net. Every year, the Hagoita Market (Hagoita-ichi) is held at Sensoji Temple in Asakusa, Tokyo, where ornamented wooden paddles (hagoita) are sold. The paddles come in different sizes, and most of them feature portraits of kabuki actors and beautiful Edo ladies.
