#### $\sim$ PM Abe paid an official visit to US $\sim$

Between 26 April and 3 May 2015, Prime Minister Abe paid an official visit to US. At the summit meeting between PM Abe and US President Obama, they confirmed that Japan and US are working closely together to ensure a peaceful and prosperous future for the region and the world .During his visit, PM Abe also gave a historical address to a Joint Meeting of the U.S. Congress titled "Toward an Alliance of Hope", which was warmly welcomed by members of US Congress with many standing ovations. #### ~ Japan-U.S. Security Consultative Committee ("2+2" Ministerial Meeting) ~

On 27 April 2015, the Security Consultative Committee ("2+2" Ministerial Meeting) was convened in New York City which was attended by Japanese Foreign Minister Kishida, Japanese Defence Minister Nakatani, US State Secretary Kerry and Defence Secretary Carter. The Ministers had discussions over a range of topics including bilateral security and defense cooperation as well as approved the new Guidelines for Japan-U.S. Defense Cooperation and issued the Joint Statement. **Details** 

# $\sim$ FM Kishida attended the 2015 Review Conference for the NPT $\sim$

On 28 April 2015, FM Kishida attended the 2015 Review Conference for the Treaty on the Non-Proliferation of Nuclear Weapons (NPT) at the United Nations Headquarters, and gave a <u>general</u> <u>statement</u>. He stated his determination as a foreign minister from Hiroshima, the site of the atomic bombing, to achieve progress towards a world free of nuclear weapons with thoughts of the bombed cities in mind. <u>Details</u>

#### $\sim$ Legislation for Peace and Security $\sim$

In order to contribute more proactively to the peace and stability of the international community, the Abe government decided on the "Legislation for Peace and Security" and submitted the draft legislation to the Diet on 14 May 2015. The legislation will enable seamless responses to any situations to secure the live and peaceful livelihood of the Japanese people. There is no change in Japan's basic posture and orientation for the past 70 years, including peace-loving nation. <u>Details</u>

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# \*Tsuyu: 梅雨, rainy season

In most of Japan, the beginning of June to mid-July is marked by a rainy season, called *tsuyu*. It can begin as early as May in Okinawa but doesn't affect the northern parts, the Hokkaido Island. *Tsuyu* literally means plum rain, named after the Japanese plums that ripe in this season . Despite being called a rainy season, it doesn't actually rain every day and when it rains, it's not strong. In fact, we might say that last year there was more heavy rain during *tsuyu* period in Slovenia than in Japan. So, you may have more *tsuyu*-like rainy season here than in Japan.

How many expressions for different types of rain do you have? Heavy rain, medium, light, maybe 4 or 5? In Japan, people live with rain more closely; you can find 21 different names for rain mentioned in Wikipedia.

Some of the more curious are: "kirisame" (rain like fog), "sasame" (continuous very light rain. This name for this type of rain was used for a very famous novel by Jun'ichirō Tanizaki, "Sasame Yuki" or "Sestre Makiokove" in Slovene), "kosame" (weak rain, not for long time), "shigue" (passing winter shower, not so strong), "murasame" (type of rain that falls hard, then gently, and stops immediately), ..., "ooame" (heavy rian), "gou-u" (very heavy), "rai-u" (thunderstorm), "naga-ame" (long, continuous rain), etc.

Although most Japanese don't like the *Tsuyu*, they do appreciate some sights, which can be very attractive in rain, especially some temples and gardens. Some shrines or temples really show their mysterious atmosphere in such "kirisame" or "sasame".

In this season, Japanese make special **Teru teru bōzu** dolls, which they hang on the balconies or windows trying to cheer up the clouds to let the sun through again.

"Teru" is a Japanese verb which describes sunshine, and a "bozu" is a Buddhist monk or in modern slang, "bald-headed"; it is also a term of endearment for addressing little boys.

This little traditional handmade doll made of white paper or cloth identical to ghost dolls, is supposed to have magical powers to bring good weather and to stop or prevent a rainy day. Children hang them before a school picnic day singing the Teru teru box song (see at the end):
