On 10 February 2015, the Japanese Cabinet adopted the "Development Cooperation Charter" which defines the future direction of the Japanese official development assistance (ODA). Minister for Foreign Affairs of Japan Fumio Kishida stated that "based on the new framework, we will promote more strategic development assistance and further contribute to the peace, stability and prosperity of the international community." <u>Details</u>

* Ukiyo-e: Japonism: Sharaku

- 1. **Ukiyo-e** is woodblock prints and was very popular in 17th-19th centuries=Edo period in Japan. It was a culture of citizens (not of/for Samurai). They described almost everything, everyday life, nature, events, etc., but most popular themes were Kabuki stars, Sumo wrestlers and beautiful women.
- 2. Ukiyo-e was also an amusement for Edo people, like "picture print", where you could enjoy nice pictures of your favorite Kabuki stars with the latest fashion. Or you could admire beautiful scenes of faraway places in Japan, where you could never visit. Or you could be informed of famous events/happenings visually through Ukiyo-e.

3. Once introduced in Europe in latter half of 19th century, Ukiyo-e, with other Japanese culture, made a new culture movement in Europe: **Japonism**. It influenced many European artists, mainly impressionists, Manet, Monet, Whistler, Van Gogh, Degas, Gauguin, Lautrec etc. Claude Debussy grew inspiration from Hokusai and Hiroshige most prominently in "La Mer" (1905). Ukiyo-e, with its curved lines, patterned surfaces, and contrasting voids and flatness of their picture plane, also inspired Art Nouveau. Thus Japonism involved the adoption of Japanese elements or style across all the applied arts, from furniture, textiles and jewelry to graphic design.

4. There are many famous artists of Ukiyo-e, but SHARAKU was an extreme. He is known for his portraits of Kabuki actors and Sumo wrestlers with emphasized poses of dynamism and unusual realism for prints. Moreover he is a very mysterious master. We don't know who Sharaku is. His identity was not known yet and his working period was only 10 months. It is said "Sharaku" was a pseudonym of some another famous artist. Anyway nowadays his masterpieces are highly appreciated and a fine original print of Sharaku can have a price of 100,000 euro (396,000 euro in auction in Paris in 2009).
