I. Fresh/important news

\sim Visit to Palau by Their Majesties the Emperor and Empress \sim

Their Majesties the Emperor and Empress of Japan made an official visit to the Republic of Palau, from 8th to 9th April 2015, to mourn and pay tribute to those who died in the war and pray for peace in this 70th year after the end of the war. Their Majesties also received welcome from the Presidents of Palau, Micronesia and the Marshall Islands as well as people of Palau. <u>Details</u>

~ G7 Foreign Ministers' Meeting ~

From 13th to 16th April 2015, Japanese Foreign Minister Kishida visited Lubeck in Germany and attended the G7 Foreign Ministers' Meeting. Minister Kishida carried out exchanges of views among the G7 members, which share fundamental values, regarding urgent issues in international affairs. <u>Details</u>

\sim Japan-China-ROK Trilateral Foreign Minister's Meeting \sim

The Seventh Trilateral Foreign Ministers' Meeting between Japan, China and South Korea was convened in Seoul on 21 March 2015. Three Ministers, including Japanese Foreign Minister Kishida, acknowledged that there has been steady progress in trilateral cooperation in various areas, and discussed the current status and future directions of specific cooperation projects. \sim Update on Japan's Response to the Ebola Outbreak in Western Africa \sim

On April 17, the Government of Japan announced to provide Guinea with Ebola test kits newly developed by a Japanese University (Nagasaki University) and a Japanese company (Toshiba), in the amount of USD 4.02 million. 2 Japanese medical experts have been dispatched to Guinea to offer training on these new test kits. Also, 2 Japanese medical experts were dispatched to Sierra Leone in April. Total funding by the Japanese Government amounts to approximately 173 million USD. <u>Details</u>

\sim Japanese Maglev train sets new world record of 603kmph \sim

A Japanese magnetic levitation (Maglev) train has set a new world record speed of 603 kilometers per hour. The Central Japan Railway Company train set the record on April 21, 2015 at a 42.8 kilometer test track in Yamanashi Prefecture, west of Tokyo. The company plans to launch the service between Tokyo and the central city of Nagoya by 2027 and the 280km journey would take only about 40 minutes. For more information, check <u>here</u>.

\sim Five Promises for Attracting Foreign Businesses to Japan \sim

On March 17, under the leadership of the Prime Minister, the Council for Promotion of Foreign Direct Investment in Japan adopted the "Five Promises for Attracting Foreign Businesses to Japan". These promises include:

- 1. Increased usage of foreign languages in stores, hospitals and on roads
- 2. Expansion of free public wireless LAN network
- 3. Increased ease of access by business jets at the local airports
- 4. Strengthening of English language education throughout Japan
- 5. Facilitation of consultation by the Japanese government for foreign businesses with large investment

* Tango no Sekku: 端午の節句, Boys' Festival

Tango no sekku or Boys' Festival is celebrated on May 5th. Originally it was celebrated in the houses of samurai warriors. It celebrated boys' courage and determination. Many of the symbols of this day are about having the character of a samurai.

On this day, Japanese families with boys fly carp-shaped kites (**koinobori**) outside the house and display dolls of famous warriors (**gogatsu ningyo**), armors and traditional Japanese military helmet (**kabuto**), inside.

In recent years, as more people are living in smaller appartments, the koinobori and the inside decoration have also gotten smaller. Big warrior dolls, symbols of strong, healthy boys are often replaced by a smaller sized dolls or only kabuto.

The symbolic flower of Tango no Sekku is a type of iris called **shobu**. The shobu has long leaves that resemble swords. Boys traditionally take shobu leaf baths on this day.

One traditional food served on this day is **kashiwa mochi**. It's a rice cake steamed with sweet beans and wrapped in an oak leaf. Another traditional food is **chimaki**, which is rice wrapped in bamboo leaves.
