~ Approval of New Laws for the Development of Legislation for Peace and Security ~

On 19th September, the New Laws for the Development of Legislation for Peace and Security were approved in the diet. The legislation will enable seamless responses to any situations to secure the lives and peaceful livelihood of the Japanese people. Japan will be able to contribute more proactively to the peace and stability of the international community under the policy of "Proactive Contribution to Peace". Video

The World Assembly for Women: WAW! 2015 was held in Tokyo on August 28 and 29 in order to further promote the realization of 'A Society where Women Shine,' which Japan is engaged in at home and abroad. The event was attended by Prime Minister Abe and Foreign Minister Kishida as well as approximately 150 leaders and others active in women-related fields from approximately 40 countries participated. ~ Establishment of Slovenian Business Forum for Tokyo Olympic 2020 ~

On September 10th, the 3rd regular meeting of Slovenia Japan Business Council was held at the residence of the Japanese Ambassador. In this meeting, "Slovenian Business Forum for Tokyo Olympic 2020 (SBF TO 2020)" was established under the SJBC. Mr. Miroslav Cerar, Honorary President of Slovenian Olympic Committee, gold medallist of pommel horse of Tokyo Olympic in 1964, also father of Prime Minister Cerar, was appointed Honorary President. Also, the "Committee for Promotion of Japanese Investment" was established.

~ Completion of Japanese financing to the project "IMF Technical Assistance in South Eastern Europe" ~

The Government of Japan has been financing the project to strengthen public finance systems in South Eastern European countries through "IMF Technical Assistance in South Eastern Europe" from 2009. This project was successfully completed and handed over to the European Commission. On September 17, the reception was organized by the Center of Excellence in Finance (CEF) to express gratitude to Japan. *Aki Matsuri (秋祭り), "Autumn festivals"

It is very natural that after a rich harvest, people wish to celebrate with a joyful festival, the festival of autumn. In Japan we also have such tradition in every region.

Aki Matsuri in Japan is usually celebrated to express gratitude to the local god for a rich harvest. This festival is marked with joyful celebrations including the colourful parades with so-called "Mikoshi" (Shinto shrine). The Mikoshi contains the local shrine's kami (Shinto deity) and is carried through local streets so that people can worship it and thus thank for the rich harvest. Mikoshi can be preceded by a "Dashi/Daijiri", colourful float, which is pulled through the town to make way for the Mikoshi, accompanied by people dressed in traditional style, performing traditional music and dances.

During the Aki Matsuri, local area and shrines are full of festive atmosphere, with numerous cultural events and small stands. People enjoy delicious festival food like okonomiyaki, ikayaki, and cotton candy.

One of the most famous Aki Matsuri is the autumn festival in Takayama, "**Takayama Festival**", visited by many people from all over Japan. Giant Dashi floats are pulled through the streets. There is usually a daytime procession of the floats, but the most elaborate part takes place at night-time when the Dashi are lit with hundreds of traditional lanterns. Along with the floats are marionettes that are performed on top of the floats, traditional marching bands, musical performances, and the shishimai lion dance.
