\sim World Assembly for Women in Tokyo: WAW! Tokyo 2014 \sim

The World Assembly for Women in Tokyo (WAW! Tokyo 2014) will be held in Tokyo from **12 to 14 September 2014**, jointly hosted by four institutions including the Government of Japan and will be participated by international organizations like IMF, UNDP, UN Women. Through the symposium, messages and ideas on how to further promote women's active roles will be sent out to the world. You can read more about it here and here.



In addition, the period from 8 to 19 September has been designated as the Shine Weeks and a series of women-related events will be held in Japan by various groups including civil society. We hope the Shine Weeks events will generate a movement for "<u>A Society Where Women Shine</u>" across all of Japan.

\sim Prime Minister Abe's Visit to Latin America and the Caribbean \sim

From 25 July to 2 August 2014, Prime Minister Abe visited Mexico, Trinidad and Tobago, Colombia, Chile and Brazil and held meetings with the leaders of these countries. In Brazil, the Prime Minister also made a policy speech "Juntos!! Bringing infinite depth to Japan – Latin America and the Caribbean Cooperation". 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* KIKU (菊, Japanese Chrysanthemums):

Is the most celebrated of all Japanese fall-flowering plants. This flower is most appreciated by the Japanese for its beauty and was used as a medical plant already in the Heian period (794-1191). In the Edo period (1603-1867) Kiku cultivation became very popular, and varieties of chrysanthemums were introduced. At that time skilful techniques were developed for displaying and enjoying chrysanthemum flowers. People made large dolls using kiku trained into human forms, usually of famous people and characters from folklore. They still are commonly seen at kiku-matsuri (kiku festivals) even now. Japanese enjoy the variety of Kiku exhibits in autumn, where they can admire their beauty and observe a Kiku flower measuring up to 20cm in diameter.

Some Kiku flowers are edible and can be prepared as tempura or cooked as a soup. Kiku is also a symbol of the Japanese Imperial family.
