<More stable 3 years for Prime Minister Abe>

The Prime Minister Shinzo Abe, after the Lower House election victory last December, also won the Upper House election last summer. Now his coalition has majority in both Houses and he can expect to continue with such a stable government for three more years, until the next Lower House election in 2016.

< Japanese economy shows growth >

His first ambitious policy of ABENOMICS, the fiscal-economic policy aimed at relaunching the Japanese economy, has already shown very positive results. The growth reached 4.1 % in the first quarter of 2013 and 3.8 % in the second quarter.

With such a stable government, Prime Minister Abe has launched other new Japanese policies at this year's General Assembly of the United Nations. They are entitled "Proactive Contribution to Peace" and "A Society in Which Women Shine".

(1) Security Policy: Proactive Contribution to Peace

Besides the continuous Japanese efforts for world peace, P.M. Abe expressed his determination to realize an even more peaceful and prosperous Japan, the Asia-Pacific region and the world, based on the principle of "Proactive Contribution to Peace".

(2) A Society in Which Women Shine

The other policy developed this time by P.M. Abe is to assist women around the world to realize "A Society in Which Women Shine". This idea has received high praise by the international community. For the details, please see the attached document No.2

<New pamphlets about territorial issues >

Our territorial issues with neighbours are important but complicated. Now the Ministry of Foreign Affairs of Japan has prepared <u>new simple pamphlets and video clips</u> about the Senkaku islands and the Takeshima islands. Japan intends to handle those issue based on rules of the international law.

(1)Senkaku Islands

The Ministry has recently issued two-page informative leaflet "Japan's Position on the Senkaku" which is attached to this letter (No.3). Japan will act firmly and calmly to maintain its territorial integrity and will continue to strive for peace and stability in the region based on the international law. <Diplomatic Conference on Minamata Convention>

From 7th to 11th November 2013, the Diplomatic Conference on Minamata Convention was held in Kumamoto and Minamata-city in Japan, where the Minamata Convention was signed by 92 countries, including Slovenia. On this occasion, the Japanese government announced assistance worth 2 billion US dollars to developing countries in order to tackle environmental pollutions.
